## Garry's Thoughts

Go to the ant, you slacker! Observe its ways and become wise. Although it has no overseer, officer, or ruler, it stores its food in summer. It gathers its provisions at harvest time.

Proverbs 6:6-8

The Bible says a lot about budgeting and preparing. But, I particularly like this warning against laziness found in Proverbs. Particularly when it comes to planning and preparing the budget for the Presbytery; a task that rates up there with a visit to the dentist of having to sit through a (Insert name here) sermon.

But, it is a necessary part of the job. But thank God...oh amen...thank God!! for Robyn Cooley and Christy Allen, both of whom for whatever crazy psychological (or psychotic) reasons seem to enjoy doing the budget. Robyn, because that's her job and training. And Christy...well....mmm... not sure really.

Anyway, last week was Presbytery Budget time as we prepare for the submissions we make to the CPMP (Combined Presbytery Ministry Pool) in order to fund not just what we do in the Presbytery, but getting the monies to provide support for some congregations and fund others.

One of the reasons I really dislike budget time is because of the "drain" our Presbytery is upon the the whole system. You see, the CPMP is basically the money that each of your congregations give every month, combined with the same contributions from every other congregation right across the state. This money goes into a fund from which the seven Presbyteries seek both operational funding as well as any money available to fund new projects or support existing ones. And by and far the Carpentaria Presbytery has the biggest call upon these funds. In 2019/20 our contributions across all the congregations of the then North Queensland and Calvary congregations into this fund was just under \$200,000. However, our call these funds (that is, what the NQ and Calvary Presbyteries received from the CPMP was a whopping \$1.4million!! That's around \$1.2million that was raised in other Presbyteries for OUR ministry. Compare this to Moreton Rivers Presbytery that gave just over \$900,000 and received under \$300,000 from the fund.

Now, its true that we have the lion's share of most of the remote ministry and just about all of the Indigenous ministry, but its still a very sobering set of numbers.

The problem is is that the current process is probably not sustainable into the future. More and more the Presbyteries giving most to the CPMP are wanting to get more in return to plant new churches or provide a wider range of ministry. And thanks to Covid, there is increasing doubt that there will be the bucket of money in the CPMP we need to do the stuff we believe God is calling us to do across the whole Church.

This was one of the drivers, but not the only one, behind the formation of the Carpentaria Presbytery. With just that one act alone, we were able to make around \$100,000 of savings in the 2020/20201 budget alone. But we know more needs to be done.

So, it was with the threat of a shrinking CPMP funding bucket and our strong commitment to support the needs of our congregations, particularly in the Calvary Zone that Christy, Robyn and I gathered to go line by line through our budget in order to find the savings we believe we will need to make to the core funding of the Presbytery in order maintain ministry in our our most vulnerable communities.

And it was tough. By 2pm on the first day, I was starting to zone in and out. By lunchtime on day two, I was contemplating ringing Lifeline. But we got there.

We are bringing a budget to the table of the Presbytery Synod Interface (PSI) with a further almost \$120,000 in savings across the Presbytery. This mostly comes from Marie moving back the halftime and savage cuts to our travel and meeting costs. (Presbytery meetings and retreats are a costly expense when you have to fly so many people in for them and provide accommodation etc.)

And it will mean that we will need to make some changes. Firstly, we are joining our minister's retreat to the May Presbytery in order to cut travel costs. And while we know this is not ideal, we feel it is important to lay out the reasons for doing this.

We don't know yet what Covid has really done to the budgets of the other Presbyteries, but Robyn, Christy and I know that despite Covid, the congregations in our Presbytery have risen to the challenge of these times and we've seen some generous increases in CPMP contributions across the Presbytery. But we also recognise that we, as a church, at Synod, Presbytery and Congregational levels are going to have to change a number of things we have taken for granted for so many years.

Hence our support Project Plenty that is tackling some of the fundamental issues at the core of our church in order to sustain and grow ministry into the future.

Please pray for Christy and I as we argue our budget at the meetings leading up to June this year. And give thanks to the skill and commitment of Robyn who works tirelessly (and I mean this) to make sense of where God is leading our Presbytery into the future through her gifts in administration.

And please pray as we continue to make hard decisions in order to give every ministry we have in our Presbytery the best chance to grow and be fruitful for the Kingdom of God.
