The alternative is the unitive thinking that we find in Christ, seeking insight, uncovering facts and applying grace. This thinking elevates the will toward relationship and seeks the commonality of our humanity. Unitive thinking is the thinking of the mature. To be unitive takes great courage, courage to know I don't have all the answers and I probably won't have all the answers. Courage to believe I could be wrong and at times wrong headed. And courage to be humble, to trust people and to trust God, in spite if our gut feelings. The basis for unitive thinking is kindness, the type of kindness that exists just because one chooses to be kind and in no way premised on whether the other deserves kindness or is likely to reciprocate in like manner. Unitive thinking really is the only response that can genuinely be called christian.

Review of chaplaincy ministry

Over the past 12 months, the Synod has been on a journey of listening, discerning and refining to envision the future of chaplaincy.

Through this prayerful process there was an overwhelming sense of opportunity and a desire, not just to maintain the status quo (impressive as it is with over 430 individuals serving in full-time, part-time or volunteer capacities in a variety of sectors across the state) but to expand.

The aim over the next five years is that every chaplain or volunteer that wears the Uniting Church in Queensland badge is appropriately trained and resourced for their role. This is part of the church's effort to foster a renewed discipleship culture through modelling, educating, training and equipping. There will also be a revised governance structure to make the ministry of chaplaincy fit-for-purpose. The biggest change is that the Chaplaincy Commission will no longer be involved in the oversight of chaplaincy placements and processes and the day-to-day management of chaplains. Rather, moving forward the Chaplaincy Commission will focus on providing access to credentialed professional development training for everyone, setting standards and overseeing the implementation of the strategy. All operational activities related to chaplaincy will be managed and governed by the employing bodies.

Moderator Reflection Covenant

Principles for Child Safe organisations

The Uniting Church in Australia has developed ten principles to demonstrate a child safe organisation that keeps children and vulnerable people safe.

Principle: Families and communities are <u>informed</u> and involved in promoting child safety. The Uniting Church acknowledges that families have the primary responsibility for the upbringing of their children. Strong family, community and cultural connections create protective factors which can impact a child's vulnerability to abuse.

Principle: Physical and online environments promote safety. The Uniting Church acknowledges that physical environments and <u>online behaviour</u> can impact the safety of children. We will take steps to mitigate risk as much as possible. We make online <u>behavioural expectations</u> of our people very clear. We make space for all people to <u>voice concerns</u> about the safety of children.

All of the resources are available in the <u>Safe Ministry document library</u>.

New training schedule for Safe Ministry Lay Training

New reporting laws started on 5 July 2021 which target behaviour that ignores or hides the sexual abuse of children pursuant to the Criminal Code (Child Sexual Offences Reform) and Other Legislation Amendment Act 2020. The new training schedule for Safe Ministry Lay Training to be implemented 2022-2023.

In response to these new reporting laws, the <u>training schedule</u> for all lay training has been amended to include training modules that provide strategies:

- to increase online safety; and
- to reduce opportunities for grooming and sexual abuse.

The new training schedule is available and should be implemented over the next one to two years. Most of the changes relate to leadership roles, church councils and lay preacher roles.


