

Garry's Thoughts

People get ready, there's a rain a-coming.....or something like that.

Well, its almost mango season.

Its also almost cyclone season.

So, now is the time to be thinking about what preparations you and your congregation are making in case of a tropical storm and the real threat of a good old-fashioned North Queensland wet season.

Over the next few weeks, its imperative that your church councils start thinking about what plans you have in place. Some simple conversation starters are...

Do we have a generator...or generators so we can help people who loose power?

Do we know our local SES co-coordinator, or emergency service folk so that we can offer ourselves in time of need?

Do we know what the other denominations in our patch are doing so that we can work together in the time of a crisis or in the period of recovery after?

Are all our buildings secure and watertight?

Do we have a community evacuation plan?

Do you have members who can serve as chaplains in the community during recovery, or can offer their services to other communities in time of need?

Just remember that the Presbytery has four generators available across the Presbytery, 1 in Cairns, 1 in Atherton, 1 in Mission Beach and 1 in Townsville. So if a need arises, contact the Presbytery office and we can get them used if required.

But the number one thing you need to be doing now is to be looking out for each other. See if anyone in your congregation needs help in cyclone preparation. Just a quick check on someone can make all the difference. Maybe they have been previously affected or are too ashamed to ask for a place to feel safe during or after an event. Having a spare bed or beds available during a cyclone event can be the greatest gift to someone who is unsure how their house will fair.

The weather bureau is predicting an earlier, longer and possibly more dangerous wet season this year, so lets be ahead of the game.

Most of us have been there before. But remember there will be people in your congregation and community who have never experienced a cyclone, or even a North Queensland wet season, so lets make sure everyone is supported, well-informed and prayerfully ready for anything that nature might throw against us.

Being unprepared for that which we know is coming is exactly what Jesus bemoaned in Luke 12:35-38 when he called on people to be prepared. Like the return of the master, we know the wet season is coming, so...people, get ready, there's a rain acoming!!

Peacemaking or peacekeeping?



The Merriam-Webster dictionary defines a peacemaker as "one who makes peace especially by reconciling parties at variance". Personally, I have rarely seen proper peacemaking. Most of what I have experienced could be classified as peacekeeping, which is "the preserving of peace especially international enforcement and supervision of a truce between hostile states or communities". This means that a show of force will deter conflict between two or more parties.

We see this all the time.

Through peacekeeping, the actual reason for the conflict is rarely resolved. International forces come in to protect the innocent and keep the peace. After a

very short time weaknesses appear in the international forces and the local militia fighters take advantage creating yet another war, which they call a just war because in their view it is against a foreign occupying force. Once the foreign forces leave the conflict continues.

Update regarding the review into the Synod Chaplaincy Commission

We are delighted to announce that we in the process of appointing a Chaplaincy Commission Executive Officer to implement the new directions outlined in the chaplaincy strategy. Details are currently being finalised, but it is anticipated this new person will join us in early December.

The General Secretary will be appointing a chaplaincy transitional project board for a period of 12 months. After that time, a new Chaplaincy Commission will be appointed by the Synod Standing Committee. This approach will allow us to align ourselves with other missional reviews occurring across the Synod which might reshape how the chaplaincy mission is governed.
