## 40 Days of Hope & Renewal

A daily devotional by Rev Garry Hardingham

#### Day 25 - Ecclesiastes 4:9-12 - True Humanity

Two are better than one, because they have a good reward for their toil. For if they fall, one will lift up the other; but woe to one who is alone and falls and does not have another to help. Again, if two lie together, they keep warm; but how can one keep warm alone? And though one might prevail against another, two will withstand one. A threefold cord is not quickly broken. Eccl 4:9-12

Human beings are social animals. We didn't evolve in isolation. Instead, we relied on a community in which every person had a role. The men would go out and hunt for meat or they'd prepare housing and look after livestock. The women would typically forage for roots and fruit. The children would help the women once old enough. In other words, there was a division of labour in which each person relied on another to maintain their quality of life. Being alone was extremely uncommon, simply because your survival chances were so small. But in today's world, it's easy to survive by yourself. Mind you, only because we have a society that cares for the individual. Buying a steak is not like killing a mammoth.

However, loneliness appears to be related to a bunch of negative health consequences. Why? Scientists think it might have something to do with the body's primal stress response to isolation. Being by yourself was a sign that you'd been cast out from the tribe. As a result, all your stress responses go into overdrive to protect you from the predators in the environment. This could be why people who are by themselves for long periods of time start to suffer health consequences: their body's response to stress has real, physiological effects which then cause a range of health problems. We know that for men especially an indicator of longevity is linked to their marital status. To put it simply, married men live longer than single men. The main reason is that the average man is less likely to cook healthy meals than an average woman. And shockingly, a single person of either sex is 5 times more likely to die from an infectious disease than a married one.

I believe better life and health outcomes for married couples come not out of selfish need, but a relationship not based on what the individual gets out of it, but what each partner gives of themselves for the other. What is true in marriage should also be true in society. Christ calls us to serve one-another. If you want to discover Christ, serve. For servitude taps into that deep desire for humans to live socially and to find hope and meaning in relationships.

My favourite part of the marriage liturgy is this: "Marriage is the sacred and life-long union of a man and a woman who give themselves to each other in love and trust. It signifies the mystery of the union between Christ and the church." The "mystery of the union between Christ and the church" lies in fact that Christ died for His church. Christ cares for His church. Christ encourages, equips and feeds His church.

And this is call upon each of us who commit ourselves to be in relationship with another. Whether that be in marriage, in work, or in friendship. We are called, as human beings, to be in a relationship of servitude to each other. I think this is why these last few years of the coronavirus pandemic has so unsettled me. Because it has shown the dark side of human selfishness...my body, my choice, my freedom. To live authentic human lives we need to recapture what it means to be in true relationship with each other and with God. To be prepared to give up some of our own warmth to warm those around us. In this be true life.

#### Prayer:

God of Selfless Love,

Fill us with a love for each other that reflects Your love for us.

Your love is patient, let us be patient with each other.

Your love is kind, let us be kind to each other.

Your love does not envy, let us not be envious of each other.

Your love does not boast, may our relationship be built on humility.

Your love does not dishonour others, let us honour each other.

Your love is not self-seeking, let us love each other with a selfless love.

Help us to love each other well.

Through Jesus Christ, our Lord, Amen.
