From Garry

Presbytery Minister Rural and Indigenous Engagement Report March 2022

While it has only been 5 months since our last Presbytery meeting, there has been a lot happening in the rural, remote and indigenous areas of the Presbytery.

A few Farewells

I want to start by thanking Pastor Leonard Paul for the commitment he showed in his service to the church in Aurukun. Aurukun is a tough gig and while the road was not always smooth, Leonard helped guide the congregation through many community upheavals while working with them in dealing with some internal struggles and divisions. While he and Jocelyn have returned to Mornington Island, we look forward to continuing to work with Leonard and give thanks to God for his ministry and commitment. And thank you Craig Mischewski for jumping into the cauldron we call Aurukun to continue to support them.

I also want to publicly give thanks to Jan Bryde and for her commitment to the mission of God in this Presbytery and to the PLT where she served as secretary for a number of years. Jan has always been willing to go where God and the church has called her and she and Colin will be sorely missed from our Presbytery. Happy retirement Jan!!

Finally, I want to also thank Chris Guise for the ministry he has undertaken in Edmonton and in the Kennedy Bush Chaplaincy. While neither of these placements were necessarily smooth sailing for all sorts of reasons, Chris maintained his integrity throughout and was always committed to the work of God. The connections he has made within the Kennedy Bush Chaplaincy will flow through to those who follow as we continue to build on what has gone before and dream of what will come in this vital ministry. We wish Chris and Sarah all of God's blessings into the future.

Establishing new partnerships of Hope

Over the past 40 days, I have written a series of daily devotions as a way of drawing our Presbytery together around the themes of Hope and Dreaming. As we come slowly into a post-covid world, it is time for all of us to take stock of the past two years and to dream of where we are going over the next few years.

I have spent a large part of my time lately looking at our Presbytery's missional and financial future. In this, I have been engaged with a number of our rambunctious allies in the Synod office and in the Department of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Partnerships (DATSIP) in developing a number of community partnerships so that we can better utilise our property assets in our remote placements as well as ask three important questions:

- 1. Do we need to be here?
- 2. If we are meant to be here, how should we be present?
- 3. What assets of church, agency, community and government can we bring together in order to achieve holistic outcomes for the people God calls us to serve.

These questions are behind the establishment of the Southern Corridor Chaplaincy in Cairns, in partnership with Uniting Care, our conversations over the future of indigenous ministry in Townsville, the establishment of a co-operating congregation in Cloncurry with the Anglican church, the establishment of a childcare centre in Weipa and how we utilise our land assets on Thursday Island.

But, I think these are questions that all of our congregations should be asking. Project Plenty reminds us that we are indeed a rich church, blessed by by both material and human assets and multiple ministry strengths, particularly in our community services. I wonder what Jesus would do with these assets?

Working in the wider Synod

While there is a lot to chew on in our own Presbytery, the wider work of the Synod and how we, as one part of a number of Presbyteries, work and engage with each other is vitally important. We have something special in this Synod. And that is the Presbytery Synod Interface (PSI) and the monthly gathering of the Presbytery Ministers to encourage each other and to work on how we can best utilise our assets across the Synod. This is unique within the Uniting Church. For instance, in NSW, each Presbytery basically looks after itself. And so the rich city Presbyteries have enormous potential, while to remote Presbyteries, like Riverina, have almost none.

In contrast in Queensland, much of the ministry we do in this Presbytery is both supported and funded by the other Presbyteries, particularly Moreton Rivers, South Moreton and Bremer Brisbane whose generosity continues to make me so thankful to be in the Qld Synod.

So working together is not just a "fun" thing Christy and I do every month, but vital to the outcomes of many of our rural and remote ministries.

Personal notes

I feel like I'm living in a catch-22 scenario when it comes to getting plane back in the air and am kind of regretting I didn't just recondition the motor I had instead of embarking on a major overhaul. The plane is almost back in the air (I'm awaiting some engine sensors from the US). The problem is that because I can't fly the plane, I am doing an extraordinary number of driving days. Because I am away driving so much, I don't get time to work on the plane. And because I can't work on the plane, I can't fly and so I drive...a lot.

In December we welcomed out eldest daughter, Catherine, her partner, Craig, and their two-year old, Elise to Malanda from Weipa. Now Teresa has three grandchildren within striking distance and a fourth due in early June. Having been separated by huge distances from most of our family for many years (almost 20 all up), it is wonderful to be so close and see the joy that grand-parenting brings to Teresa. We are so thankful to God for this season.

All in all, I am excited by what the next few years is going to bring. While ministry is always challenging, I feel blessed to be in this Presbytery, surrounded by many who pray for us and support us, including our moderator who, when he starts a conversation with "Now Garry..." I know is looking out for my best interests. Thanks Andrew.

But mostly, thank God!!
