DARING HOPE

This week's Reflections on A Daring Hope come from a selection of staff from the Office of the Synod



I work in Family and Children's ministry, in particular in missional partnership with schools, playgroups and early learning centres. I love watching people grow and learn who they are and how they fit. My daring hope is that people would step into the uncomfortable, dangerous space of coming into real relationship with other people who they might otherwise not connect with. I pray we bravely navigate the complexities of the world today and find afresh the simplicity of Jesus' ways to do life together - Jess.

My name is Dave, I live and live and work on the land of the Yugambeh and Turrbal Peoples. *My Daring Hope* for Chaplaincy is that it would grow. Grow in recognition, grow in influence and grow in opportunity. I wholeheartedly believe that Chaplaincy is a key example of "hands and feet" ministry in our communities. A ministry of presence, that journeys alongside people along the different pathways life takes us. A presence that expresses the heart of "we are with you" (whether you come to our buildings or not). My daring hope is that we can have more Chaplains, in more spaces, in more places, reaching more people and making a real difference in our communities, than ever before - Dave.





My little daughter delights in the small things in life such as twirling a crimson coloured leaf between her fingers or jumping in muddy puddles. As the climate changes, incidents of natural disasters increase, automation takes over jobs and the young are locked out of the housing market, I am overcome with dread for the future. I fear that in thirty or so years my daughter will struggle to live a happy life and find meaningful work in Australia. But the Uniting News article gently reminded me that Jesus has overcome the world. *My Daring Hope* is that Australia will act boldly to tackle the climate crisis, while at the same time remembering the many vulnerable people who live in our communities and the refugees across the world seeking safe shelter.
