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Presbytery Appeal

Bowen UCA

In 2019, as part of a fundraising event, a large donation was received by Bowen Uniting Church. In 2021, a letter of demand was received from an insolvency firm to return the funds. After much investigation into the legitimacy of the claim and the rights of the congregation, it was determined that the demand to return the funds was legal and that the congregation would have to pay.

Bowen UCA having received the funds in good faith, applied the full fundraising amount to the cost of ministry. Permission was given to the Synod Legal team to negotiate a settlement figure on behalf of the congregation. The agreed amount now owed is \$25,000.

At our Presbytery meeting on the 5 November, a Presbytery wide appeal was launched to help Bowen. If you would like to help see bank details below. Let's help Bowen clear this amount so that they can get on with the work of valuable ministry they do to the community.

Garry's Thoughts...

Hezekiah's Illness

"Then the word of the Lord came to Isaiah: 'Go and say to Hezekiah, Thus says the Lord, the God of your ancestor David: I have heard your prayer, I have seen your tears; I will add fifteen years to your life. I will deliver you and this city out of the hand of the king of Assyria, and defend this city." Isaiah 38:4-6

Isaiah 38 starts with an impending tragedy. King Hezekiah was going to die. Isaiah told him plainly that he would not recover from his illness, that he should get his affairs in order. Hezekiah was understandably devastated. He "wept bitterly."

He prayed to God and pointed out what a good person he had been. Not unexpected. I imagine I would do the same if I were given a terminal diagnosis.

But, in Hezekiah's case, God responded quickly—he gave Hezekiah a reprieve from his illness for fifteen years. Not indefinitely. Just for a set amount of time. And we don't know how old Hezekiah was at this point. Was his life extended until he was 45? 60? 80? Would it make a difference?

What would I do if, on my deathbed, I got a message straight from God telling me I had fifteen more years? Would I be bitter that I didn't get to live longer? Would I be so blown away by the second chance that I'd dedicate my life to doing better in my work and relationships?

Would I try to cram in as much experience—and probably self-indulgence—as I could in that time, I mean really milk it for all it was worth?

I would hope that I would see the time as gift and use it wisely and according to God's will for the time. But I can't be sure—I'm human and flawed like everyone else.

Liturgically, we are now in the first week of Advent. It's a new liturgical year. And Advent moves us towards the incarnation of Christ, also known as Christmas.

I like Advent. I really dislike Christmas, but I like Advent.

I like it because in the midst of the business of Christmas, Advent reminds us about what or more, importantly, who, this whole shebang is all about. Because its all about Jesus.

Perhaps this text is a call to wonder about just what we are doing with our lives in this moment? Are there ways in which we might be closer to God and God's direction for us? Are we squandering time in worrying about things we can't control rather than enjoying the abundant beauty of God's creation? Are we holding onto resentments rather than making peace with the people in our lives?

Why wait until we know our time is limited, when we live now in the spaciousness of moments and the blissful ignorance of the day of our death?

Why not ask God to point us to the nearest opportunity for meaningful interactions with the world?

Maybe, after the tumultuous events of the last year, we can use Advent as a time to draw breath and to seek out God in new ways who, after all, breathes his Spirit of life into us and ask ourselves this fundamental question

How does an acceptance of mortality allow me to live a richer and more meaningful life?

Intergenerational Advent Resource

Journey to Joy Worship Planning resource (Draft Sample) - A collaborative team has created these resources from across the Qld Synod of the Uniting Church to help congregations, communities, and families celebrate Advent together intergenerationally. It contains bible readings, themes and suggestions for prayers, videos, and activities to do in worship to assist with weekly worship preparation for the four Sundays of Advent and Christmas Day or Christmas Eve. There is also an Advent Candle Litany and suggestions for a Blue Christmas / Solace / Thanksgiving and Remembering Service.

These resources are connected thematically with the *Journey to Joy Countdown to Christmas*, *Advent and Christmas Reflections* to enable ongoing engagement for congregation members, families, and people in your community over this Advent and Christmas season. These additional resources include 15-character reflections (three for each week's theme), topics and questions for discussion for small groups, families, or individuals to engage with. These reflections invite the participant to explore a character connected with the Advent story, how their own story might connect, and some challenges connected with

the weekly theme. They are designed to invite conversation, connection, and creativity across generations by providing opportunities to share and hear each other's stories and engage in activities together to explore God's big story.

Safe Ministry with Children

Supporting those who have experienced traumatic or distressing events

The Safe Ministry with Children <u>Policy</u>, and Safe Church Training, tools and resources focus on providing a safe Church for everyone. Having safe <u>boundaries</u> and respectful relationships prevents revictimisation and re-traumatisation of vulnerable people who have sustained prior trauma. Providing psychological first aid is the best approach to helping someone who has had a traumatic experience.

For example, a person's physical and emotional safety will be increased if their unmet basic care needs are addressed. Using a person-centred and trauma-informed focus, and maintaining a collaborative partnership with the person, will offer the most useful ongoing support following trauma.

Psychological first aid - Offer the person:

- Information (e.g. offer information about a local housing service or a support group the Church offers)
- Spiritual and emotional support (e.g. offer to pray with them)
- Practical assistance (e.g. offer a meal or groceries from a food ministry)
